



guests, a total of 678 individuals, attended Comanche Electric Cooperative Association's 79th Annual Meeting of the Membership under the big tent at Comanche City Park. Greeted by CECA employees on ATVs, members were chauffeured from the parking lot to the big tent, where they registered, received goody bags and proceeded to the festivities.

Past the registration tables, members were offered several options for how to spend the first part of their morning. Beneath the big tent, the Class of '57 entertained the crowd with a mixture of country and rock 'n' roll from the 1950s and 1960s—and of course, a bit of Elvis mixed in.
